Three annual events have been successfully held as virtual or hybrid events.

We were able to participate worldwide from nations such as Argentina, Japan, Canada, and Germany, from the far east to the far west, at the virtual meeting in September 2020 and the annual ASSICON 2021. The hybrid live operative surgical course at ISIC was ASSI's first of its kind, and it was a major success. We were able to innovate and use technology to further the association's cause in education and training as a result of the pandemic. There were several first-time events for the ASSI, including webinars, symposia, journal clubs, ward rounds, and meeting the masters.

We congratulate all of the faculty members who contributed to the success of this event. Last year's ASSI Fellowship training and teaching workshops, as well as the research workshops, were far more effective. The registry change, outreach program, Scoliosis app, and a slew of other activities went down without a hitch. We cannot, however, rest on our laurels.

The ASSI has progressed from strength to strength since its inception. Past presidents and committee chairs have volunteered their time to help the association mature in its teaching, training, research, and dissemination of safe spine surgery concepts. Our Registry app is in its 3<sup>rd</sup> version and recently upgraded. I urge more centers to upload and also upload follow-ups. The case discussion app has been very effective in discussing difficult cases. The Indian Spine Journal is on its way to being indexed by PubMed in the near future. I appreciate all of Dr. Anil Jain's and his editing team's efforts.



The membership of the VAAS (Value Added Spine Subscription) is continuously increasing, and I hope that in the coming years, many more people will join. Our association is unique in that it is youthful and lively, with a large number of young, dynamic, and talented spine doctors. Young people must participate more actively and lead this organisation to new heights. Spine surgery is evolving at a rapid pace, and as our understanding of our population improves, we will be able to give better and safer patient outcomes. With the latest computer navigation and robotics technology, Minimal Invasive Spine Surgery is becoming more popular and safer by the day, and I hope it becomes cheaper and more accessible to all.

The ASSI will release two new publications in Patna this year that all ASSI members should have. The association and its members must maintain an open mind and keep up with technological advancements. When performing safe spine surgery, keep in mind our diversified country, local facilities, and our patients' financial circumstances. # REPORTS OF VARIOUS ASSI COMMITTEES AND ASSI TASK FORCES

# **ASSI EDUCATIONAL COMMITTEE REPORT**

This year proved to be yet another challenging period, in which the pandemic continued to be very much a part of our lives and did not let us go back to the normal – the one we knew before March 2020. Despite the odds, the Educational committee successfully carried out the role and responsibility assigned by the ASSI. The Activities carried out this year are detailed below.

### • ENTRANCE EXAMINATION FOR 2021 - 2023 Spine Fellowship BATCH

The online proctored examination entrance exam was held after much discussion and approval by the Committee on 8<sup>th</sup> August 2021. 103 candidates participated, 15 candidates were called for counselling, and 9 candidates were selected and assigned to various accredited ASSI Fellowship centres.

### • ASSI EXIT EXAMINATION FOR THE 2019 -2021 BATCH

The exit examination for ASSI Spine Fellowship for the batch 2019-2021 was held on 16th & 17th September 2021 at ISIC Hospital, New Delhi. The Expert Panel of the Scientific, Executive and Academic Committee of ASSI approved the format for the examination, which included a theory paper (100 marks), a long case (50 marks), two short cases (50 marks each), an Oral Table 1 (50 marks) and Oral Table 2 (50 marks).

The examiners for the Exit Examination were Dr. Arvind Jayaswal, Dr. P. Sarat Chandra, Dr. Manish Chadha and Dr. HS Chhabra.

There were 9 candidates for the exit examination. These were: Dr. Sasidharan M.D.S., Dr Sanjeev Asati, Dr Deepak Agrawal, Dr. M Chandhan, Dr Jitesh Manghwani, Dr. Hriday Acharya, Dr. Kushal Gohil, Dr. Ashish Gupta, and Dr. Divakar Modipalli.

All nine candidates successfully passed the examination. The Committee would like to congratulate Dr. Kushal Gohil from Kothari Medical Center, Kolkata for securing the first rank. The Committee expresses its gratitude to Dr. H.S Chhabra, Dr. Gururaj S, Dr. Vikas Tandon, Dr. Abhishek Srivastava and Ms. Neema Bisht. The entire hospital management of ISIC was extremely supportive and took a personal interest in the conduct of the examination.

# ASSI EDUCATIONAL COMMITTEE REPORT

### • ASSI PG TEACHING COURSE

Due to the ongoing pandemic, the ASSI PG Teaching Program was held virtually on Sundays in August and September to cover common cases, X-ray discussion, and instrumentation. The teaching course was well appreciated.

### ASSI FELLOWSHIP TEACHING PROGRAMME

The ASSI Fellowship teaching programme for the academic year 2021-2022 has been started. The case discussion/teaching session is being conducted once a month with good attendance and feedback from attendees.

### • WEBSITE

The sub-committee comprising of Dr. Muralidharan. V and Dr. Gurudip Das have made modifications to the web page of the Education committee. The Education committee web page has three main headings:

- Fellowship.
- Fellowship centres.
- Teaching courses and online activities.
- The new web page is interactive and user-friendly.

### • HANDBOOK

Dr Vijay Kamath took over the responsibility of creating the ASSI Fellows handbook, which is now available on the website. The Fellowship handbook is a compact handbook that includes details of the fellows, fellowship centres, curriculum, thesis, and exit exams and is a valuable aid, both for the prospective and selected candidates, to navigate the fellowship years.

### ASSI FELLOWSHIP CENTER ACCREDITATION

The Committee is pleased to inform you that Stavya Spine Hospital and Research Institute, Ahmedabad under the mentorship of Dr. Bharath Dave, is the new and latest ASSI Fellowship centre. Dr. Abhishek Srivastava was deputed by the selection committee and successfully conducted the inspection of the centre. The Committee has also received the application forms from Dr. Rajendra Prasad, Apollo Hospital, Delhi for the ASSI fellowship training centre. The application is currently being processed.

### • Thesis update for the first-year fellows

The committee has worked towards streamlining the thesis of ASSI fellows through regular interim updates. The fellows have started sharing the thesis protocol with the Education committee.

# **ASSI Website Committee**

The committee had a busy year upgrading the ASSI website to the present user-friendly avatar. The most significant accomplishment was obtaining a secure website domain with enhanced security to have encrypted and secured financial transactions. The ASSI Research section became operational and updated and the past ASSI webinars links were uploaded to the ASSI website. The Gallery section was revised with the photographs of the ASSI outreach program held in Raipur in October 2021 and Srinagar in September 2021. Weblinks for ASSICON 2022, ISSICON 2021 events were uploaded on the website.

Future plans include up-gradation of the ASSI website to allow members to update their personal profile, recent photographs and communication details online. The committee is working on having a system-generated temporary registration number for new members as soon as they pay for ASSI membership so that they can enjoy all the perks and pearls of membership immediately instead of waiting for ASSI GBM when their membership is usually approved. To make the ASSI website user friendly we propose to use an email address as a Login username instead of LM number which is sometimes difficult to remember. To encourage members to log in to the ASSI website more frequently we propose to route in the delegate registration for future ASSICON and ICS through the ASSI website.

# **ASSI COVID Task Force**

The task force regularly updated information on the website like appropriate guidelines, literature etc about Covid management.

The task force is continuously working on :

- Updation of Covid related resources at ASSI website relevant to spine surgeons
- Uploading of Govt standard Guidelines regarding covid management
- Guidelines about operating patients who have been vaccinated
- Guidelines about Peri-operative vaccination
- Information about if somebody recovered from CVOID and how long he/she should wait to take the vaccination
- Guidelines to do antibody tests?

The task force held an essay competition under the guidance of Dr Ajoy Shetty. This year the task force has proposed to have a "Poster or painting competition "Covid and spine surgery" or any related competition with requisite approval.

As discussed in the Covid task force meeting, currently there is no practice change or new information relevant to spine surgery. In view of the new variant, the covid situation is quite fluid. The task force will keep a watchful eye and will update/guide the ASSI members accordingly. The task force decided to issue an advisory for the current situation for ASSI members.

ASSI ADVOCACY COMMITTEE REPORT

In the past, ASSI has been in touch with various regulatory bodies including the MCI and also a letter has been sent to Dr. Vinod Paul, Niti Aayog for his guidance and support.

The National Medical Commission (NMC) has replaced the Medical Council of India (BoG-MCI), Dr Suresh Chandra Sharma has been appointed as chairman for a period of three years.

A fresh letter has been sent to Dr Suresh Chandra Sharma, Chairman-NMC for carrying out about the eligibility of orthopaedic surgeons as spine surgeons.

The following is the list of ASSI Issues:

- 1. Request to issue an official notification from MCI regarding "Eligibility of orthopaedic surgeon to perform spine surgery"
- 2. Equivalence of Tariff
  - a) "Discrepancies in the CGHS/Ayushman Bharat rates for spine surgeries as applicable for orthopaedic surgeon vis-à-vis neurosurgeon"
  - b) Discrepancy in the Pradhan Mantri Rashtriya Swasthya Suraksha Mission (PMRSSM) / AB - PMJAY rate list for Spine surgeries as applicable for Orthopaedic surgeons vis-à-vis Neurosurgeons
- 3. The curriculum of the Postgraduate course in Orthopaedics Management of spinal ailments to be included appropriately in the curriculum of post-graduation in orthopaedic surgery and all relevant training programs
- 4. Consideration of recommendations of Workshop on Injury Prevention Program.
- 5. Representation related to the un-approved & unproven Stem Cell therapy being practised by some entities - formulation of appropriate regulation, in the public interest. A representation signed by the Association of Spine Surgeons of India (ASSI), Indian Orthopaedic Association (IOA), Spinal Cord Society (SCS), Indian Head Injury Foundation (IHF), The Spine Foundation & Nina Foundation societies in this regard.

The Core Executive proposes to rekindle the awareness drive and come out with a series of press releases on the topics such as safe spine surgery Etc.

### **ASSI Consent Forms**

- ASSI Consent Forms had been translated into 11 languages. Late Dr Ketan Khurjekar had spearheaded this initiative.
- The committee has received back the consent forms from Dr. Appaji Krishnan and Dr. Rupinder Chahal after the final proofreading of all translated consent forms.
- All consent forms have been sent to Dr. Kohli for his medico-legal advice, he responded that he can vet only the English consent forms and for the rest of the language consent forms he suggested some website
- Neema has already registered on this website but did not receive any response. She will again submit the request.
- Dr. Kohli and Dr. Chhabra are working on the English consent form, these consent forms will soon be available on the ASSI website for use by members.

# ASSI Capacity Development Program

Gujarat Adani Institute of Medical Sciences (GAIMS) & People's Super specialty Hospital, Bhopal had applied for the "Capacity Development Program".

A draft MOU has already been prepared and wherever the program will be launched this will be signed between ASSI and beneficiary health care facilities.

The Program has been started at GAIMS, Bhuj on 1st January 2021 under the mentorship of Dr Bharat R Dave, Dr Samir Dalvie and Dr Appaji Krishnan.

Medtronic has agreed to provide the required equipment and ASSI is providing support for live surgeries through virtual reality.

At the outset, 68 procedures were done including 36 major spine surgeries. Total Spine opd patients - around 3600.

A detailed action plan for 2022 has been devised to include service delivery along with the promotion of education and training.

A mailer could be sent to all ASSI members to check if anyone would be interested in consideration of his/her centre to be a beneficiary centre of the "Capacity development and creating excellence in spine surgery in deserving centres of India" program of ASSI.

- to initiate remote monitoring of surgeries through AR/VR system as well as to identify more centres.
- to reduce the cases for the eligibility criteria for centres for Capacity development program from 200 to 100-125.
- to work on the aim of the program to have it is not only as a "service delivery program" but also to "promote education and training."

Suggestions on "how to strengthen the program including any proposals from new centres" are welcomed by the members.

# ASSI Membership Committee

This is a newly formed committee of ASSI, whose main task is to correct and update the member's details in the database. Its responsibilities also include initiating and promoting Value Added Annual Subscription (VAAS), which was launched formally on 1st April 2021. The committee members have worked in their respective regions to promote membership.

The Herculean task of updating correct contact details of members of society, needed for smooth and optimal functioning, has been assigned to the membership committee. The membership committee has already started working on the same and has incorporated multiple ways to do the task by dividing its members into Zones (North, South, West and East), who would be responsible for personally approaching these members and getting their updated information to update the Data of ASSI.

VAAS is a much-needed requirement to modernize the Association with an updated membership list. This will also enable us to give additional privileges to the VAAS members.

Some of these are :

- Free subscription to e-journal (ISJ)
- Eligibility for various official positions
- Rebate the registration fee for all the conferences and events organized under the aegis of ASSI
- Eligibility for applications for Research Grants / Awards / Fellowships
- Eligibility for participating in Spine Registry and Multi-centric Research Projects
- Eligibility for presenting papers at ASSI events.

There are three membership slabs, available on the ASSI website for the VAAS membership.

- Life Membership fee of Rs. 5,000/- + 18% GST
  - Value Added Subscription Services (VASS)
    - Annual Charges Rs. 1000/- per year + Rs. 180/- (18% GST) = Rs. 1180/-.
    - For 03 years Rs. 2500/- + Rs. 450/- (18% GST) = Rs. 2950/-

The idea of the VAAS is to improve the active participation of our members in the activities of the society and also identify them and felicitate them as and when deemed appropriate. Presently the membership committee is working on formulating a point system for identifying these active members.

At present we have around 3900 life members in which enrolled 254 (177 with 3 yr subscriptions and 77 with one-year subscriptions) are members all over the country with the western part of the country having the most members.

# ASSI Nomination and Constitution Committee

During the GBM held during ASSICON 2021, there was discussion regarding the revision of eligibility criteria for various posts including consecutive terms, and publication/submission in ISJ as a prerequisite for candidature in EC.

The nomination committee in its meeting recommended that ASSI revert to a 2 years term for President subject to requisite approvals. It was also decided that EC members can't have 2 consecutive terms. It was agreed that the President-Elect will assist the President in the day-to-day functioning of the Association and perform all the functions of the President in his absence.

The list of Executive should be filed every year with the registrar of the Societies and the changes in the constitution should be circulated to the members for their opinion with a timeline. If they agree, then it will be put up to GBM for final ratification.

### **ASSI Election 2022**

The following vacancies were announced during the last GBM:

As you would be aware that earlier we received 04 applications for the post of Executive Committee Member. Only one person was found fit to contest for the post while the rest three were found ineligible. Due to this predicament, the nomination committee of ASSI recommended a call for fresh applications with a revised deadline.

We have received 08 applications in response to the fresh call for the post of "Executive Member". As per the screening status - *Dr Sarvdeep Dhatt and Dr Tushar Rathod* did not fulfil the eligibility criteria. Hence *only 06 members are eligible* for the post of Executive Member.

As we have only 02 seats available and all 06 members are eligible for the post of "Executive Member". Hence there would be an election between all 06 candidates for the post during ASSICON 2022 in Patna.

# ASSI Research and Award Committee

ASSI Research and Award Committee streamlined the various ASSI research activities including the formulation of guidelines for multicentric studies and research proposals. Timelines for various research proposals are being set up and the studies going on under the banner of ASSI are being closely monitored. Multicentric studies under the banner of ASSI are making international footprints in the form of prestigious podium presentations and PubMed indexed publications. All ASSI research activities are regularly updated on the ASSI website. An independent panel of judges was formed for all ASSI research awards and the panel successfully completed the evaluation of various awards, based on which results were declared.

The committee has been instrumental in starting a bi-annual Research Methodology Workshop, which was widely appreciated and the first 2 of them were overbooked and completed. This virtual program was coordinated by Dr Janardan Aithala and involved a galaxy of eminent faculty from across the country. A unique project entitled "Delphi Based ASSI Survey regarding the indications of surgery in a biopsy-proven case of Adult Spinal TB" was started and the second round of questions is soon going to be circulated. Future plans of this committee include strengthening of current guidelines and timely completion of current projects, continuing the ASSI Research Methodology Workshops and enhancing the participation of centres of excellence in multicentric studies.

# **ASSI Case Discussion Task Force**

There have been constant efforts to make this mobile-based App more usable and informative for our ASSI members. There has been a significant increase in the number of ASSI Members who have downloaded the App and got authenticated. This number has now reached 604.

Executive committee members of ASSI, ASSI Core Committee Members, ASSI Connect coordinators and ASSI Fellows have been active in further enhancing the usage and to rerefine the App on day to day basis. The App has gone through an upgradation too. Now cases can be uploaded through a laptop also. There have been uploading of 698 cases so far.

At present ASSI CONNECT is in better shape with new features. The initial hiccups have been sorted out by the developers. The task force strongly feels that it is a continuous process of metamorphosis and the issues which arise have to be dealt with on an urgent basis. Feedback from all the participants is very vital for continuous improvement hence the task force requests all the uses to raise any issues which can then be worked out with the developer.



# **ASSI Social Work Committee**

Within the constraints of the pandemic, social committee work was continued, with the innovation of virtual clinics at multiple locations, in the far-flung corners of the country. Regular online OPDs for spine ailments along with multiple health camps were conducted for various rural areas which included SEARCH - Gadchiroli, DY Patil Medical College - Kolhapur, GMC - Akola, Tribal health initiative hospital - Sittilingi, Tamil Nadu, tribal villages of Rajnandgaon and Bilaspur in Chattisgarh, deep interior border adjoining villages in Rajasthan and Shahdol, Katni, Bhopal of Madhya Pradesh, Srimad Rajchandra hospital, Dharampur, Gujarat and Govt Medical College, Ambajogai.

ASSI central social committee is in discussion with the government of Madhya Pradesh, Govt. of Chattisgarh and Govt. of Rajasthan to adopt district health care centres for providing quality spine and Orthopedic care in liaison with ASSI. MOU has been submitted and we expect the permissions in place very soon.

The district health centre, Trauma centre, Shahdol Madhya Pradesh was visited by the team of the ASSI social committee and requirements for creating a world-class spine Center were informed to the government officials. Similar discussions with officials in Katni, and Bilaspur are in place and we expect the necessary permissions very soon.

It was decided that the ASSI logo should be used during all social work activities either virtual or physical and they are doing so.

# **ASSI Spine Registry Committee**

The committee had virtual meetings and will release the updated Version 3 will be available soon with additional diagnoses e.g. Covid, Robot, O-arm, Navigations, Missing Diagnosis. In order to encourage regular data contribution, the centres which have not uploaded the cases in the last few months are to be removed. If the center/s wants to be a part of the registry, they will have to re-apply for it. It was decided to make the follow-up data mandatory for each centre at 03,06,09,12 months. To introduce new diagnosis and open-ended box for the "Name of the Patient". To introduce "alert option" for the follow-up entry. This will make sure that the center adds data on the follow-up basis. Collaboration with IOA Registry.

The following 05 research questions have been finalized to allot to ASSI Fellowship centers:

- 1. Morbidity and mortality data of spinal surgeries from the national ASSI Spine Registry
- 2. post-operative and post-procedural spinal infections: Epidemiology and their management from the national ASSI Spine Registry
- 3. Management and outcome of spinal injuries from the national ASSI Spine Registry
- 4. Long term clinical Outcomes of surgeries in high cervical injuries a prospective study from ASSI Spine Registry
- 5. National tumor registry-outcome and management of various Spinal Tumors

# ASSI elearnspinr.org Task Force

ASSI came out with <u>elearnspine.org</u> on the lines of <u>elearnsci.org</u>. There are two versions for <u>elearnspine.org</u> – one for spine experts and the other for consumers.

This Proposal was approved by ASSI in January 2019. Finalization of Editorial board, coordinator and sub-committee members had been done. The web resource was being prepared by Grapes Software. Guidelines for authors for each sub-module had been framed. We have launched 4 modules and 22 sub-modules of the resource during the ASSI Virtual Conference in 2020. Work on the other modules and sub-modules is on and hope to launch more of them during the forthcoming ASSICON.

The Editorial Committee Meeting decided to include a module on "Surgical steps and Video Library" and suggested uploading 20 videos of the ASSI live Surgical Course in 2018. Experts have been finalised and requested to prepare surgical videos. The module on "Surgical videos" will be able to show the various surgical techniques through video recordings contributed by stalwarts in the field as per a common predecided format. There are around 12 surgical videos ready as per the guidelines.

# **ASSI Prevention Committee**

As always the Taskforce was very active in organizing various events throughout the calendar year and especially on SCI Day.

The theme of SCI Day this year was "Covid-19 and SCI: Staying healthy with the help of Telecommunication and Telehealth". Due to the pandemic, it was not possible to carry out in-person activities and given the threat of the 3rd wave, it was suggested only to have online activities.

The task force intends to carry out the injury prevention program in 20 cities with various ASSI member representatives. The injury prevention program had been launched during the ASSICON 2021 conference on January 21 under the aegis of the Health Ministry, during which the representative from the Health Ministry participated and was happy to support the injury prevention week.

A detailed action plan has been worked out for 2022 and is being executed diligently by the task force which includes outreach through various local spine associations and other agencies to create awareness and sensitize the population at large.



# **ASSI Program Committee**

After two tumultuous years, when words like Mask-up, social distancing, and COVID 19 entered our lexicons, the Association of Spine Surgeons of India together with the Bihar Spine Society is getting ready to host a physical ASSICON, at Patna from 29th,30th April & 1st May 2022. As usual, the scientific program for the meeting will be of the highest standards and will focus on "Degenerative afflictions of the Back and Neck". Workshops on advanced surgical techniques and video demonstrations of various spine surgeries are also being planned.

The ASSICON 2022 is composed of 04 pre-conference workshops, International faculty participation, Keynote addresses, Presidential Lecture/orations, ASSI awards, VTI Medal Papers, Presentations, Panel discussions, Free Paper and Rapid Fire Sessions, post-conference workshops, interactive case-based discussions, where you all can participate by putting in questions, this is one Academic bonanza no one should miss. Additionally, we have joint sessions with the Scoliosis Research Society (SRS) which promise to be an educative and exciting sessions.

After ASSICON 2022, The program committee is designing a program for ICS 2022 & SpineWeek 2023.

# **ASSI ISJ Task Force**

The task force is pleased to inform you that ISJ got indexed in 'Directory of Open Access Journals(DOAJ), SCOPUS and Scimago Journal Ranking. The Process for evaluating the journal for indexing with Pubmed Central (PMC) is in progress. The task force requests all the members to cite ISJ articles where relevant while submitting a manuscript for publication, which will further help in getting the journal indexed with PMC.

We are planning to get the journal indexed with PubMed Central (PMC), To create a page/link on social media sites with an aim to increase the visibility of our journal. Planning to start ISJ Award for Best Published Paper, if approved by ASSI - EC. The publisher will change from Wolters Kluwer to SAGE later in the year, as decided in previous zoom meetings. The current agreement with Wolters Kluwer is expiring on 3<sup>rd</sup> Oct 2022. The publisher needs to contact pharma/surgical companies for advertisements for ISJ to generate funds. Publishers can also contact agents/subscribers to get more subscriptions. Senior members and executives of ASSI to help in procuring advertisements.

Dr. Upendra Bidre wished to be excused from being a member of the ASSI Task Force due to other commitments. Dr. Pankaj Kandwal and Dr. Ankur Nanda have been included in the Editorial Board as members.

ISJ has received 69 manuscripts so far, which we hope will reach 130-140 by the year-end. All the members are requested to submit at least one original article to ISJ to increase the number of submissions. If there is an increase in submissions we may look into the possibility of increasing the frequency of journals. The task force encourages all the members to keep their email and mailing addresses updated for the prompt delivery of the Journals etc.



# **ASSI Outreach Task Force**

Given the prevailing pandemic hesitation, the already decided program for outreach was not feasible. However, since the pandemic is not evenly spread throughout the country and there are safe regions in the country with low incidence. The task force decided to have an outreach program at such places in hybrid mode.

The first outreach was done in Srinagar on September 25, 2021, at Police Hospital, Srinagar. Dr. Shankar Acharya President ASSI and Dr. Rupinder Chahal Joint Secretary /Treasurer ASSI and Chair ASSI Spine Outreach Program were present. Dr. Shankar Acharya was the course chairperson and Dr. Suhail Afzal was the organizing secretary. 49 delegates had registered for the program. The delegates included eminent and senior orthopaedic surgeons along with senior residents and postgraduate students. The scientific program devised was "Fundamentals and Basics of Spine surgery" targeting the young and aspiring Spine Surgeons of the valley. The program had 4 sessions:

- 1) Lumbar Disc Prolapse and Lumbar Canal Stenosis
- 2) Spondylolisthesis
- 3) Infections
- 4) Thoracolumbar Trauma

The second ASSI Outreach Program was held in AIIMS, Raipur on the 16th of October, which is "World Spine Day". The department of Orthopedics, AIIMS Raipur hosted the spine outreach program in collaboration with Chhatisgarh orthopedic Association in the AIIMS Raipur auditorium. The organizing chairman was Prof Alok Agrawal. The whole program was conducted in a hybrid mode to avoid many gatherings because of COVID regulations. The total number of participants present physically was 52, in online mode 89. The program was also aired on ORTHO TV in which 11 people had logged in.

The third ASSI Outreach program was held in Durgapur on 03rd April 2022 at Durgapur. The Highlights of the course are as under:



# Increasing Life Expectancy: A boon or bane?

There is something very enticing about the edentulous smile of old people. It is something akin to a toddler's smile. Whenever I spoke to Mrs Lakshmi, her smile and incessant speech would be captivating. She was a breast cancer survivor and had lived courageously braving the troubles of major surgery, chemotherapy, periodic scans and innumerable doctor visits for 8 years. When I first met her in the clinic a year ago, she presented with back pain which turned out to be a recurrence of breast cancer with spread to the spine.

Like a brave soldier, she went through a major spine surgery and recovered well. But the mandatory post-surgical radiotherapy to the spine resulted in a wound breakdown. She was in her 8<sup>th</sup> decade now and co-existent diabetes and cardiac issues were serious challenges to healing her wound. But she never missed sporting her smile whenever I met her. Finally, she was discharged after a month-long stay.

Like a ghost movie, when we thought that she had successively come out of our hell, she returned to the hospital six months later, with a clot in her lungs. Now she had lost her innocent smile. With the long periods of hospitalisation, multiple tubes likely to be inserted into her, a battery of investigations and prospects of another surgery loomed large on her. I was pretty sure that with intensive care and high-end medications, we can prolong her survival but she had lost her will, like me. The life expectancy of an average human being was around 40 years in the early 20<sup>th</sup> century. Due to dramatic improvements in modern medicine and public health initiatives, the life expectancy has soared to 75 years now across the globe (The global population aged 60 years and above in 1980 had doubled by 2017).

In particular, vaccines to reduce the incidence of communicable diseases, early diagnosis and treatment of non-communicable diseases, effective surgical treatment and handling of complex injuries have made humans live longer than their ancestors. Though many lifestyle diseases like diabetes, hypertension and heart diseases are affecting people earlier than before, a barrage of medications is available to keep these diseases under control. Many take these medications for 20 to 30 years decreasing the risks of early death. Modern cancer chemotherapy, precision surgery and focused radiotherapy have made the survival of cancer patients much longer than before. All these have kept death at bay but at the cost of disability. This poses philosophical questions of prolonging the disability due to ageing.

As we age, the incidence of neural diseases like Alzheimer's and Parkinson's diseases, and musculoskeletal diseases make the mobility of elderly people difficult and painful. In developed societies where an adequate social health care system is in place, the lives of the elderly are reasonably well supported. Social discussion groups, home care nurses, delivery of essential goods and recreation centres help them tide over the disability with reasonable comfort. All governmental and private places are equipped with ramps, easy access to toilets, elevators and comfortable parking places such that the senile continue to have a life that they enjoyed in their later years.

However, in developing countries like India, the increasing life expectancy among the elderly seems to be a bane for many. The disintegrated joint family system and lack of governmental societal support is a double whammy on the plights of the elderly. With many children working abroad or having odd and long working hours, the old people are left to fend for themselves with their disabilities and sometimes with a significant financial burden. They are dependent on online delivery agents and good Samaritan neighbours and auto-drivers, to access basic groceries and services. The problems are further magnified by the psychological effects of loneliness ('Empty-Nest syndrome') adding to the physical impairments.

Unlike other animals and plants whose life expectancy has remained the same for millions of years, humans have tricked nature and prolonged their life, albeit with a bad baggage. Modern science is evolving leaps and bounds every day, finding treatments for many diseases and postponing the inevitable. I am not arguing that science should not evolve and diseases should not be treated. But there should be simultaneous changes in the way how we move into old age and how we are supporting the elderly. Similar to retirement financial plans, physical fitness to reduce future musculoskeletal disability should be focused on, at least from mid-life. Sedentary lifestyle, job stress and obesity in the background of prolonged life are fodder for disability in the older age. Emphasis should be made on prevention in earlier years and later to improve the quality of life, ease of living and preserving dignity, rather than just prolonging life for the sake of it.

### ASSI Participation in the 2nd International Spine meeting (INSPINE 2022) in Kathmandu, Nepal on 9th April 2022


